Interventions: Experience of Institut pour la Santé, la Population et le Développement (ISPD) in Haiti during 2021



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Background

The Faith Community Initiative (FCI) is a PEPFAR/USAID-funded project that works in several African and Caribbean countries to spread messages of hope about HIV through faith communities. Specifically, it intended to expand HIV care and services through the engagement of faith leaders committed to educating in order to reduce HIV related stigma & discrimination and facilitating access to HIV prevention and treatment services In Haiti, the Institut pour la Santé, la Population et le Développement (ISPD) has implemented FCI in three municipalities in the country: Delmas, Cap-Haitien and Jérémie between 2020 and 2021 (Fig. 1).

Best Practices

1.- Strategic Collaboration

To address the difficulties of church members in accessing HIV services, ISPD opted to have a networks of Agents (liaison officers) linking health facilities to healing sanctuaries where a large part of the population seeks alternative care.

They received a basic training on HIV/AIDS, Interpersonal Communication and educational materials printed by ISPD



2.- Provision of HIV services and care through faith-based congregations

Following the dissemination of messages of hope on HIV and the positive reception of congregations' members, faith leaders in Delmas and Cap-Haitien proposed that ISPD brings HIV counseling and testing services (HTS) to their shrines and churches in order to facilitate access to such services for followers. A team comprised of community nurse and Community Health Workers goes to the different places to provide HTS. Eligible people received assistance for selftesting. Those with reactive test were sent for Confirmation test and ART enrollment. High-Risk individuals with non-reactive tests were referred to Health facilities for Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis (PrEP) services. Other clients were also referred for non-HIV services based on needs identified during consultations.

Regarding these objectives, the interventions prioritized three main areas (Fig. 3), although Training sessions on Therapeutic raising more awareness through the dissemination of HIV messages of hope and prevention.

Capacity building of leaders through orientation or trainings on HIV and AIDS. Technical and financial support for the dissemination of HIV messages of Hope Provision of HIV testing and appropriate follow-up services based on test results.

Two-day training sessions were held on therapeutic adherence and faith healing for Figure 3: Main FCI areas of interventions 100 Catholic young leaders, including youth group and choir leaders in selected areas (**Fig. 5**). At the end of each session, two participants per area were selected as "leader-educators" to sensitize members from their respective communities. A total of 703 Catholic followers from parishes preselected by the Episcopal Conference of Haiti were reached.

Collaboration with CSOs (Fig. 8) consisted in a proximity accompaniment to provide close support to faith-based organizations in addition to their participation in the Sterring Committee. Two CSOs, ODELPA (Organisation *de Developpement et de Lutte contre la Pauvrete)* and ACESH (Action Citoyenne pour *l'Egalite Sociale en Haiti*), collaborated with the Catholic and the Vodouists respectively.

Results

Following the strategy to push awareness messages to the most isolated communities through sensitized faith leaders involved in the fight against HIV, the majority of individuals were reached through community-based activities (Fig. 9).

Success Story

On AIDS Day 2020, ISPD facilitated the participation of the President of Seventh-day Adventist Missionary Union (UMASH) in a capsule on "the commitment of leaders in the fight against HIV & AIDS" produced by the National Program to Control HIV&AIDS. He called on his colleagues to join him in an engagement towards the achievement of the 2030 objectives. The fact that a Christian leader of major congregations in Haiti has taken an open stand in the fight against HIV&AIDS is an unprecedented and amazing accomplishment.

Following the presentation of the project to key Civil Society representatives (**Fig. 4**), ISPD initiated a series of meetings with the hierarchical leaders of the largest religious congregations, namely, Catholic, Protestant and Voodoo. The objective was to share essential information about the initiative in order to ensure consistency, describe the proposed activities and create the Steering Committee which will act as an advisory body to their respective denomination. Due to the fact that HIV and AIDS is a taboo topic, notably in religious communities, they



Peer outreach among vodoo adepts Collaboration with vodoo sector started with a conference on the issue of stigma and discrimination against People Living with HIV held jointly by ISPD and the Executive Committee of the National Confederation of Haitian Voodooists (KNVA in maternal tongue) (Fig.6)

Subsequently, ISPD facilitated training sessions for "KNVA's Heads of Zone" who would in turn conduct sensitization campaign through 300 Voodoo temples [honf $\dot{o}(s)$] in the commune of Delmas. They reached more than 1500 members of the honfòs' Management boards.

30607 individuals were reached during sensitization campaigns, 2234 underwent HIV risk Assessment, 817 received testing services, 70 were newly enrolled on HIV, 63 returned to care and 291 were enrolled on PrEP. A total of 9977 leaders participated in training and orientation sessions on HIV and AIDS.



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
